### **SERMON QUESTIONS**

## **OPENER:**

Were you familiar with Isaiah 53 before learning about it in this week's sermon? What strikes you about this passage? How can this passage help lead us into Easter Sunday?

## WHAT DOES THE PASSAGE SAY ABOUT MY SINFUL NATURE?

#### **READ ISAIAH 53.**

This passage speaks about how the servant was rejected. Answer the following questions:

- What about the servant caused people to reject him?
- Why do you think it's so easy for us as humans to do this? Why do you think some people reject Jesus?

### WHAT DOES THE PASSAGE SAY ABOUT GOD?

- The Servant in Isaiah 53 sacrificed. He was willingly punished for someone else's crimes and sins. As Pastor Dave put it, the servant stepped in as a substitute for the people that actually deserved it.
  - What does this sacrifice mean to you?
- The passage also shows that the servant triumphed.
  - How can such big a sacrifice as this be considered a triumph?
  - How was the death of Jesus on the cross ultimately a triumph?

## **HOW DOES THE PASSAGE POINT TO JESUS?**

- What evidence do you have that the servant in this passage is a prophecy about Jesus Christ?
- READ ACTS 8:26-40.
  - What is impactful to you when you read this passage?
  - How can this interaction be a model for how we talk to others about Jesus and our faith?

# **HOW DOES GOD WANT ME TO RESPOND?**

- As we enter the last week before Easter, look back on this year's Lenten time. What has God been teaching you, whether through the sermons each week, a small group, or even just your circumstances or interactions with others?
- When you let the truth of what Christ did for you be personal, it will change your life. How has this been true for you?
